2023 BILLS HB2332 FIREARMS SAFETY; TRAINING; SCHOOLS (Rep. S. Bliss) bill

would require school districts and charter schools to provide age-appropriate fireams safety training to students in grades 6-12. However, the Governor vetoed this proposal. In her veto statement, she asserted that enforcing compulsory firearm safety training in schools is not the answer to preventing gun violence.

HB2394 FIREARMS; SOVEREIGN AUTHORITY (Rep. A. Smith)

The Arizona state and its subdivisions would have been barred from allocating personnel or financial resources to enforce or cooperate with any unique taxes or fees personner or inflated a resources or entore or copletate with any unique taxes or less on firearms, firearm accessories, or ammunition that could deter law-abiding citizens from buying or owning them. The Governor vetoed this, noting in her message that the bill gives the firearm industry an exemption from standard regulations that other

HB2544 - ARIZONA MANUFACTURED; MODIFIED FIREARMS (Rep. L.

Diaz)

A firearm, accessory, or ammunition modified in Arizona and staying within its borders wouldn't fall under federal law or regulations related to the U.S. Congress's power over interstate commerce. The Governor vetoed this, citing concerns that it could restrict federal authorities and cause confusion due to diverging state and federal laws.

HB2667 - DISRUPTION; EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION; CONCEALED

HB2667 - DISKUPTION; EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION; CONCEALED WEAPON (Rep. R. Jones)
The proposed bill would have forbidden university, college, or community college boards from enacting or enforcing policies against concealed weapon possession by valid permit holders or against firearm transportation and storage. The Governor vetoed this bill, citing potential heightened risks on campuses and unintended outcomes.
HB2705 - SCHOOLS: SAFETY TRAINING: PILOT PROGRAM (Rep. L.

Biasuicci) The Arizona Department of Education (ADE) introduces the School Active Threat

The AUROID Department of Education (ALIZ) introduces the Seaton AURO I Takes Response Filot Program to offer sately training and alto school districts and charter schools. For FY202-32, the legislature altots \$10 million from the general fland for this initiative. This legislation is backed by AZCID, and aligns with the "FASTER Saves Lives" campaign. STALLEDIN SENATE APPROPRIATIONS. SB1090 - FIREARMS; CONTRACTS; PROHIBITED PRACTICES (Sen. F.

Carroll)
A proposed bill would have mandated public entities, when contracting for services, supplies, IT, or construction worth \$100,000 or more, to include a written assurance from the company against discrimination towards firearm entities or associations. However, the Governor vetoed this, deeming it unnecessary and fearing it might drive

banks away from Arizona, escalating costs for local governments. SB1109 - PROHIBITED WEAPONS; MUFFLING DEVICE; REPEAL (Sen. W.

NB1097 - ROJIDITE BUTCH CONTROL RESERVENCE AND RESE

A proposed bill would have barred educational institution governing boards from preventing a parent or guardian with a valid concealed weapons permit from carrying a fream on school property. The Governor velocid this legislation, expressing concerns that concealed weapons on school grounds could pose risks, including potential confision for law enforcement during active shooter incidents.

SB1428 - POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS; GUNSHOWS; PREEMPTION (Sen. J.

SB1428 - POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS; GUNSHOWS; PREEMPTHON(Sen. Wadsack)

A proposed legislation aimed to prevent political subdivisions from barring gun shows or enforcing any directive primarily impacting gun shows to an extent that it effectively bans them within the jurisdiction. However, this proposal was vetoed by the Governor. In her justification, the Governor opined that such a bill unduly limits the discretion of local governments to determine and enforce measures ensuring the safety of their respective communities.

SB1713 - NONPROFIT SECURITY GRANT PROGRAM FUND (Sen. D.

Gowan)
The Arizona State Nonprofit Security Grant Program is created to fund safety measures for nonprofits vulnerable to terrorism or hate crimes due to their principles or mission. Administered by the Arizona Department of Homeland Security, grant distribution commences on January 1, 2024. Applicants must meet specific criteria. For FY2023-24, \$5 million is allocated from the general fund to this program.

SCRIOIS - INITIATIVE; REFERENDUM; SIGNATURES; LEGISLATIVE DISTRICTS (Sen. J.D. Mesnard)
The 2024 general election ballov will pose a question regarding amending the state Constitution. The proposed amendment seeks to change the signature requirement for statewide initiative measures. Instead of collecting signatures from the state's entire voting populace, the amendment suggests obtaining signatures from 10 percent of votes in each legislative district for a statewide measure and 15 percent for amending the state Constitution. 2024 BILLS HB2243 FINGERPRINTING; CRIMINAL HISTORY; RECORDS CHECKS

HB224 FINGERPRINTING; CRIMINAL HISTORY; RECORDS CHECKS (Rep. O. Nguyeth at the Arizona Board of Fingerprinting reviews an individual's background only when they apply for a good cause exception, while also removing the obligation to report discovered crimes during background checks to state agencies and the affected individual. Additionally, it allows the submission and retention of biometric data by criminal justice agencies and mandates the release of an individual's clearance card is superaded and a good cause exception is requested. SGGED HB284 DEFENSE OF PREMISES; DEFINITION (Rep. 1. Heap)

HB284 JUFENNE OF PREMISES; DEFINITION (Rep. J. Heap)
This legislation adds outbuildings to the "custle doctrine," altering the definition of "premises" for justification defense to include any real property or structure adapted for human residence or lodging. The Governor vetoed it, stating it utules property over human tife, incentivizes vigilantism, and would allow unnecessary use of deadly force and violence with impunity. VETORD
SB1167 SOCIAL CREDIT; DISCRIMINATION; FINANCIAL SERVICES

(Sen. J. Kavanagh)

AzCDL supports this bill because promotes fair business practices and transparency in the financial services sector. By prohibiting financial institutions from engaging in discriminatory practices, it ensures equal access to financial services for all customers. Furthermore, it establishes mechanisms for customers to seek redress in customers. Furthermore, it establishes mechanisms for customers to seek redress in case of service demail, including an investigation by the Attomey General and potential civil action, which strengthens accountability in the financial industry. SB1189 centralizes firearm regulations at the state level, preventing confusion from

SB1189 centralizes firearm regulations at the state level, preventing confusion from local ordinances and ensuring consistent understanding and access to Second Amendment rights. It also prohibits local restrictions on gun shows, protecting lawful commerce and the cultural tradition of gun ownership. VETOED SB198 DISRUPTION; EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION; CONCEALED WEAPON (See. W. Rogers)
SB1196 ensures consistent application of state frearm laws across cleuational conflictions of the properties of the concept of personal responsionity and trust in marvaturals who have been destined competent and safe to carry concealed weapons through a rigorous permitting process. STALLED IN THE HOUSE

SCRIB07 FIREARMS; CONTRACTS; PROHIBITED PRACTICES (Sen. F.

Carroll)

Amending Title 35, Chapter 2, Article 4 to prevent discrimination against firearm entities in public contracts ensures fairness and neutrality in government procurement by requiring companies to certify non-discrimination against firearm entities or trade associations. The provision to repeal this amendment by 2033 allows for future research ensuring ongoing relevance and effectiveness in the commercial and legal landscape. STALLED IN TITLE HOUSE.
